## The Story of the Poppies

Memorial Day is a holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who have died while serving in the U.S. military. But what is the story behind the red crepe paper poppies we see being passed out around that day?
The advent of the red poppy as a symbol of war casualties was a poem written in 1915 during World War 1 by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae. He noticed clusters of poppies covering parts of Flanders Field in Belgium where he was serving as a brigade surgeon for an Allied artillery unit. In the spring of that year, a huge battle took place, killing 87,000 allied soldiers, including one of Lieutenant Colonel McCrae's closest friends.
Heartbroken, he wrote the poem "In Flanders Fields". Told from the perspective of the fallen soldiers buried beneath the poppies, it honored the troops who lost their lives in that conflict

In 1918, after reading "In Flanders Fields", University of Georgia professor Moina Michael wrote a poem titled "We Shall Keep Faith" and started wearing a red poppy in honor of the troops. She then came up with the idea of making and selling red poppies to raise money for veterans.
On September 27, 1920, the poppy became the official flower of The American Legion to memorialize the soldiers who fought and died during the war. In 1924, the distribution of poppies became a national program of The American Legion.
So now on Monday, May 27, when you see someone wearing a bright red poppy, you will know they do it as a sign of respect and to honor those who served and died for our country in all wars, making the ultimate sacrifice to protect our freedoms. - sources from Readers Digest and Good Housekeeping

## Mother Church

"You cannot have God as your Father, if you have not the Church for your mother." - St. Cyprian of Carthage, North Africa. Martyred for his faith in Christ in 258 A.D.

May is a month that is full of celebrations, remembrances, and memorials. At Peace Lutheran, we will be celebrating Confirmation this Sunday as our Confirmands "confirm" their faith in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. In doing so, they will increase their commitment to the Church, the Body of Christ. Many years ago, a politician declared that "It takes a village to raise a child." She had said this to undermine the importance of a child's parents, and to increase the role of the government in raising children. For this she was severely criticized by many Christians, and rightly so. However, I always thought there was something about her statement that did ring true, but I did not know how to respond. Now I know! It does take more than parents to raise a child. It takes a church to raise a child!

As a congregation we come alongside our families and children and help them growing in faith and in living out that faith in Christ. This is why we celebrate Confirmation! The children of our church are confirming the faith of their baptism. Even in our baptismal vows, we declare that "We believe that God gives the gift of faith in baptism, but that this gift will be lost unless the child is taught the Word of God, upheld by prayer and given a Christian example to follow. This is first the responsibility of the parents, then the sponsors, and then the entire congregation." As St. Cyprian wrote, it is the Church that "mothers" us along in our new life of faith that has been given to us by God, our Father.

The following Sunday we will celebrate Mothers' Day as we recognize the essential role that moms have, not only in bringing us into life, but also every day of our life. The role that moms (and dads) have is crucial to our wellbeing in life. In Deuteronomy 6:4-9, God gave the "Great Shema" which the Jewish people repeat yet today. "Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord is one! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. ..." Then it goes on to say that children are to be taught the Word, Will, and Ways of God at the beginning and ending of every day, and throughout the day. There are to be daily routines pointing our children (and parents!) to the Lord.

In Psalm 22:9,10 we are told that infants can have saving faith from the moment of birth, because faith is a gift from God, and not a product of one's intellect. In the Gospels, Jesus affirms that children can believe and receive salvation. Luke 18:15-17 records that parents were bringing their "nursing infants" to Jesus. Jesus receives them and declares that the "kingdom of God belongs to such as these." Matthew writes about the seriousness of "causing one of these little ones who believe in Me [Jesus] to stumble..." (18:6) The Apostle Paul writes to Timothy reminding him that he had come to faith in Christ in infancy through the Holy Scriptures. (II Tm.3:15) I'm so glad that Peace Lutheran is a church that welcomes little children into the family of God!

On the third Sunday in May, we celebrate Pentecost, the ancient Jewish Feast during which the "first fruits of the harvest were offered to God." This is on the $50^{\text {th }}$ day of Resurrection (Easter Sunday) Day. This "first fruits harvest" was a promise of "more to come." It was on Pentecost that the Father and the Son sent the Holy Spirit, who descended upon the Apostles and those gathered in Jerusalem who were waiting in prayer. This was the beginning of the Church; therefore, on Pentecost we celebrate the "birth" of the Church. Even as this occurred on Pentecost, we also have the promise that there is "more to come." The spiritual harvest is just beginning! Billions more souls would be saved in the millennia to come.

On the fourth Sunday of May, we observe Memorial Day. In the U.S. we are thankful for our freedoms and we recognize that "freedom is not free." It was secured through the sacrificial death of many. Even as we observe Memorial Day, we recognize the truth that spiritual freedom also was not free. Jesus sacrificially laid down His life upon the cross to save us for all eternity. Every Sunday we gather to celebrate Christ's resurrection and the new life that we have in Him as He has set us free from the bondage of sin, death, and the devil. We gather as local congregations, part of the universal Church, as brothers and sisters in the Body of Christ.

## FROM THE COUNCIL

1. Pastors report: He is currently teaching the book of Jude in the adult Sunday School class. 3. The Evangelism Committee reported that the prayer leaders are lined up for National Day of Prayer service on May 2nd at 7 pm . Greg has been helping to line up the music for the service. There was also some information concerning online giving research discussed.
4. The Finance Committee reported that our income is good and expenses in line. The Rase Scholarship fund is up some.
5. The Parish Life Committee reported on plans for the Ladies Luncheon on May 4th at noon. There will be food and activities. The Men's cookout will be on June 8th. Bonnie Richardson and Tina Jones would like to chair the committee when Patty's term is up this fall. There was some discussion around this.
6. The Property Committee reported that light fixtures damaged by storms were fixed. There was some water in the church basement as well. The carpet in the Sunday School room and the carpets in the front of the church were cleaned. Mulch was laid around the parsonage and church. Some estimates were obtained for carpet. Approval was given to purchase a new sign for the front of the church.
7. The Youth Committee reported that an acolyte schedule has been created for both services. The youth helped with the Easter breakfast. Thank you to the men who fixed the food! The money collected there will go to the FLY fund. The Second Sunday youth program is going to start a service project to help the Ronald McDonald House in Columbus. A tentative date of May 19th is set for the youth bonfire. Some possible summer activities: Pool party at Haverfields, church-wide outing to the Living Word Drama near Cambridge.
8. The Stewardship Committee is making plans for Servant Saturday on May 18th. Information will be in the bulletins and Newsletter. There was also discussion on the Lent donation distributions.
